

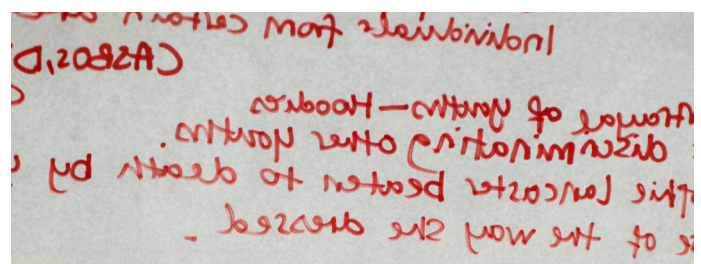
RYDZYNA NEWS
